



Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, a beautiful city located in the Golden Triangle formed by the confluence of the Monongahela and the Allegheny Rivers which forms the Ohio, not only offers beautiful vistas, but also provides a rich menu of cultural and entertainment venues.

For good food and exciting panoramas, the restaurants and bars at the top of Mount Washington are mandatory for first time visitors. These are located near scenic overlooks and the historic Duquesne Incline. The best time to go is at night when the lights of the city offer spectacular views. The Incline is open at night and rides are encouraged. For seafood the Monterey Bay Sea Food Grotto is my personal favorite.

For many restaurants, night life and shopping, the two most popular destinations in Pittsburgh are Station Square and the Southside. The Grand Concourse at Station Square is a restored train station and offers first class dining. Reservations are recommended for the Monterey Bay and the Grand Concourse

Pittsburgh's cultural district provides an extensive venue of entertainment possibilities. During the weekend of March 26 and 27th the following events are scheduled: Carmen at the Benedum, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Coat produced by the Pittsburgh Musical Theatre at the Byham, and The Prize produced by the Pittsburgh Public Theatre at the O'Reilly

Theatre. Additionally, the Cabaret Theatre offers Salsa Friday and a comedy show on Saturday night. The Backstage Bar hosts a local blues player on Friday night and a local jazz trio on Saturday night. Reservations are recommended for the major venues.

The Phipps Conservatory which will be presenting its spectacular spring show is located within walking distance as is the Carnegie Museum, home to a world class dinosaur exhibit and the Hall of Architecture.

Farther afield, the famous miniature train exhibit and the planetarium are located in the Carnegie Science Center. The Andy Warhol Museum and the National Aviary are a short ride away on the Northside where Heinz Field and PNC Park are also located.

Boutique shopping is available in Shadyside. Nearby is Clayton House a preserved Victorian mansion, once home to Henry Clay Frick. On the same grounds are the Frick Museum which will be hosting an exhibit on Depression Era Artists and an antique car museum. The tea room at Clayton House is reputed to have the finest lunch in Pittsburgh

About an hour's ride from Pittsburgh one can visit Falling Waters, the home designed by Frank Lloyd Wright for the Kauffman family constructed over a water fall. It is Wright's most famous private home. Reservations are recommended.

The hotel provides free shuttle service to downtown, Station Square and Mount Washington.
